International Migration and Refugees

The purpose of this course is to examine how the nation state system affects the genesis, organization, and effects of voluntary and forced international migration. The course will include: an overview of large-scale human movements in history; the emergence of the nation state and the role of migration in state formation and consolidation; state rules about entry and exit and their impact on international relations; the production of refugees and internally displaced persons; voluntary international migration and settlement; temporary labour migration; and an overview of the escape for future migration for voluntary settlement, work, and escape from violence.

This course will examine refugees in the context of the study of international relations. It includes: definitional problems with particular reference to the current situation in Eastern Europe and the USSR and its impact on refugees from outside the European region; the projected policies within the European Community in 1992; the political constraints on planning for refugee emergencies; the foreign policy implications of receiving refugees; case studies of the Horn of Africa and Kurdistan; the fundamental causes of refugee migrations; and solutions to refugee emergencies including repatriation.
